This is a summary of how our school delivers music education to all our pupils across three areas – curriculum music, co-curricular provision and musical experiences – and what changes we are planning in future years. This information is to help pupils and parents or carers understand what our school offers and who we work with to support our pupils' music education.

Part A: Curriculum music

This is about what we teach in lesson time, how much time is spent teaching music and any music qualifications or awards that pupils can achieve.

Children have a one hour lesson every half-term. Each week, children participate in a 30-minute vocal assembly.

In Year 4, children have an opportunity for whole-class ensemble teaching in their weekly music lesson for a term, leading to a final performance.

Part B: Co-curricular music

This is about opportunities for pupils to sing and play music, outside of lesson time, including choirs, ensembles and bands, and how pupils can make progress in music beyond the core curriculum.

Our school promotes and celebrates music learning and achievement outside school. For example, children perform pieces on recorder and piano in Celebration Assemblies.

Children from Year 1 have the opportunity to join an extra-curricular choir, with costs to cover first aid and staffing. Pupil premium children are eligible for one set of club sessions without charge.

Children in Year 6 have the opportunity to join a weekly hour-long 'Show Club' for the last 3 half terms of the academic year.

Pupils can use playground spaces, where they are supervised, to rehearse projects and musical performances.

The music lead attends music hub networking sessions and training.

Part C: Musical experiences

This is about all the other musical events and opportunities that we organise, such as singing in assembly, concerts and shows, and trips to professional concerts.

Singing is developed strategically building on skills and flashing back to build a broadening repertoire in daily assemblies.

We celebrate performances of the choir and whole school at termly festivals in Church.

Year 6s participate in an annual Showcase with a range of performances.

In the future

This is about what the school is planning for subsequent years.

We have trialled monthly live performances in singing workshops and look to introduce annual trips to whole key-stage concerts such as BSO (Bournemouth Symphony Orchestra) shows.

We look to further consider individual and group instrument and vocal instruction in school and an additional whole-class ensemble teaching opportunity in Year 6 on another instrument. In addition, we intend to increase to develop instrumental skills from whole-class ensemble teaching in Year 4 with follow-up units using Kapow in coming years.

There is the potential to look to staff an instrument ensemble after school as a club, such as recorder or Samba club.
